FIRST GRADE

SECOND GRADE

The first graders are starting to make their mark in the PACE world as they started the school year seeing old faces and making new friends. Parents and caregivers also started volunteering in the classrooms to the delight of their children.

This Fall has included learning about apples, using descriptive language, comparing and contrasting, building foundational reading skills through rhyme, and writing about what makes our world wonderful. In early November, the kids will set off to explore the Woodland Park Zoo. Each student researched an animal of their choosing, and began writing sentences about its characteristics, what it eats, and where it lives.

For reading, the students are working on oral storytelling as a precursor to writing personal narratives. They have grown in speaking clearly, staying on topic, listening and giving specific feedback to others. The students are developing independent reading habits as they make improvements in blending sounds to read words and learning punctuation to guide expressions. Spanish learning has also begun with lessons on Tuesdays with their teacher, Michaelah Jacoby. The kids come home singing in Spanish "Hola hola hola ¿Cómo estás? Yo muy bien y tu ¿Que tal?" (Hello hello hello how are you? I'm very good and you, how are you?).

Art docent lessons are kicking into gear too with the first one focusing on texture. The kids studied art by Henri Rousseau as they explored the textures of leaves, pinecones, stems and used them as art tools. They made prints by applying paint to the natural materials and placing them on paper. We look forward to the continued exploration, growth, learning and development of the first-grade class as they continue to have fun and bond with their PACE classmates.

During the first few weeks of math, students dove back into the level where they left off at the end of 1st grade. This is a great way to refresh their knowledge before jumping into new math. Now our students are getting to know each other as mathematicians; practicing our math addition and subtraction facts within 20 to develop automaticity, playing math games, investigating geometric shapes using tangrams, solving math mysteries, learning about place value and the basics of analog time-telling and working in the "Tiger" book.

During reading, our students practiced taking the time to read with intent. During writing, Mr. Wallace introduced students to narrative writing and helped students practice their writing stamina. Kids had fun writing and drawing illustrations for their own version of the "Goodbye Summer, Hello Autumn" story.

For a science segment, our 2nd graders have been learning about the globe, maps and how they are created, the meaning of symbols and how to read them and Compass Rose. Ask your student about the "Me on the Map" project. Our students were also busy creating self-portraits, covers for their folders and personalized labels for their book bins. They created adorable clay pumpkins that are waiting to be glazed and made hand-churned vanilla ice cream together. We are planning our first Food Docent class for November.



Our classroom was fortunate to have their first Field trip back in September to Issaguah Salmon Hatchery.

Students were able to go and tour the hatchery in person with our 5th grade buddies. We learned new vocabulary like fry, alevin, eyed egg, fertilized egg and what kind of salmon we have in the PNW.

Our students had lots of fun during our 2nd field trip to Kelsey Creek Farm. Two historic barns sit prominently on the crest of a hill, overlooking shallow valleys on each side. These barns, listed in the State Heritage Barn Register, were once home to the Twin Valley Dairy. This farm also offers a visit with their animals like horses, ponies, cows, pigs, chickens, ducks, rabbits, goats and sheep.

Some of our 2nd grade classroom traditions so far are: Daily Paws Ticket drawing, candy reward and desk fairy. In the last few months, our students practiced soccer and pacer during PE and worked hard memorizing songs for the Veteran's Day assembly.

THIRD GRADE

The 3rd graders have had a great start to the year, really hitting the ground running with learning and fun!

In literacy, we have been learning about characters. We have been talking about different traits and how they define our characters. The 3rd graders have been challenged with asking "What makes a character interesting?" when reading a story. We've also started to learn about different ways people use words to communicate, such as text messages, poems, letters, and books. Currently, each 3rd grader is working on a narrative story of their own.

We have been very busy in math and science as well. In math, we have been learning many strategies for both multiplication and division. Third graders have been practicing math facts in many ways - flashcards, games, quizzes, however we can - all the way up to 10s! In science, we learned about the solar eclipse and had a Nature Vision Incursion where we learned about what things cause pollution to our water and how we can help.

We have had some visits from our art docents, and we are talking a lot about different types of materials you can use to make art. These are called media, such as coal, charcoal, special pencils, oil pastels, and more.

We have done pop-out art, which is art that looks like it's "popping out" (three-dimensional).

We have also been learning about what to do when we need help during an emergency. We've been practicing learning important emergency contact phone numbers and when and why to call 911.

One highlight to the start of the year was definitely our field trip to see "Dogman: The Musical" at the Seattle Children's Theater with a very exciting bus ride on the freeway! The 3rd graders said they enjoyed seeing a favorite book brought to life and described it as something that Dave Pilkey (Dogman author) would have enjoyed! We of course enjoyed participating in Outdoor Ed (what a beautiful day on the water) and our Fall Festival. Looking forward to what the rest of the year has in store for our third graders!
